



# **Parks and Recreation**

Monthly Report



In summary, November revenue is down 58% compared with November 2019. This difference jumped 30 percentage points from October, when the drop was 28% from the previous year. November attendance differed by 34% from November of 2019. The drop in attendance wasn't quite as drastic as revenue; October's change was 28%. Programs and the Bowling Center have taken the biggest hit compared to the same month in 2019. This is in large part due to following the Tennessee Pledge guidelines. Group sizes for programs are still being limited and occupancy as well as league availability is drastically reduced in the Bowling Center.
