






### Dispatch

Our Dispatch unit falls under the Support Bureau, reporting to Captain Finchum. Staffing for dispatch includes one dispatch supervisor and ten dispatchers, working in ten-hour shifts. The center is equipped with state-of-the-art public safety communications equipment, to ensure calls are received and processed quickly and officers are dispatched in the most efficient manner. The employees of this unit are caring and compassionate individuals who serve the Sevierville community 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.



#### Records

Our Records Division falls under the Support Bureau, reporting to Captain Finchum. Staffing for Records includes one supervisor, one records, clerk, and the city court clerk. Records personnel process and handle all requests from the public for copies of police reports as well as processing payments for city court. They assist all visitors in and out of the police department daily.

#### City Court Citations

2022-7,037 citations processed, a 39.29% increase from 2021.

2022-city citation payments totaled \$377,856.75, a 54.55% increase from 2021.

#### The Records Division processed:

- 2,432 incident reports (0.87 % increase)
- 1,745 crash reports (2.08 % decrease)
- 3,634 arrest reports (2.28 % increase)
- 3,384 state citations (46.18 % increase)





#### Patrol

The patrol division falls under the Operations Bureau commanded by Captain Ray Brown. The patrol division has four shifts that provide coverage 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year to ensure the citizens and visitors to our community with law enforcement services. The patrol division consists of four shifts that work twelve hours per tour.

During 2022, the patrol division was restructured to enhance our supervision and coverage. The shift was split into two districts, an in town and Kodak squad. Each shift remains under the command of a lieutenant and each squad is supervised by a sergeant.



#### **SRO**

The SRO Unit consists of seven officers and one Lieutenant, which is responsible for the security and safety of students and faculty at all the schools within the city. The SRO Unit not only cover the school day, but also after school activities such as sporting events. Officers strive to create positive interactions with the students and still enforce police actions when needed.

When school is not in session the SRO Unit assists patrol and fill in where needed. They operate Kid's Camp during the summer breaks. This year there was a focus on safety and security with the school campus and buildings. They provided extra education to school administration and staff on ensuring all safety procedures that are currently in place are followed.



### Criminal Investigations Division

Criminal Investigations Division is comprised of a Lieutenant, Sergeant, four general investigators, as well as a detective assigned to the Sevier County Street Crimes Unit. Many members of the unit serve dual roles within the police department. Lieutenant Roberts serves as the SWAT Commander as well as a departmental less-lethal instructor. Sgt. Brantley, Det. Powers, and Det. Weaver serve on the Crisis Negotiation Team (CNT). Det. Parrish is also responsible for Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) investigations. Det. Weaver is currently assigned to the FBI Task Force, spending at two days a week in Knoxville, TN. She is also a member of the Crash Reconstruction Team. The undercover officer is assigned to the Sevier County Street Crimes Unit on a full-time basis but reports to the CID Unit weekly.

The general investigators are assigned the majority of the cases which require in depth investigations while the Lieutenant and Sergeant, although periodically are assigned these cases, are assigned a majority of the cases only requiring a call-back to the victim. This is important to consider when viewing the numbers of assigned cases per detective.

Cases assigned per detective for the year 2022 are as follows:

Brantley-405 (139.64% increase from 2021)


Roberts-139 (67.46% increase from 2021)

Turner-185 (63.71% increase from 2021)

Parrish-181 (19.86% increase from 2021)

Powers-185 (20.12% increase from 2021)

Weaver- 206 (44.05% increase from 2021)



Increases in trackable offenses were highlighted by domestic cases at 25.12% and child abuse/neglect cases at 70%.





## Special Operations-K9/Traffic



#### Cash Seizures: \$63,520 Vehicle Seizures: \$126,333

The Canine (K-9) Unit is assigned to the Support Bureau and attached to the Special Operations Unit. Team members are among the most elite in all of SPD. When shootings, robberies, in progress burglaries or other priority calls are dispatched, our K-9 teams are among primary responders. Teams are regularly utilized to assist in criminal apprehensions, to locate missing persons, detect narcotics or explosives, and act as back-up.

SPD is allotted five K-9 Teams, four of which are dual certified and trained in narcotics and patrol through N.N.D.D.A. which consist of Sgt. Josh Bright and K-9 Marco, Officer Jordan Paul and K-9 Hank, Officer Jacob Reece and K-9 Pebbles, and Officer Shane Chipley and K-9 Diego. K-9 Blitz retired in June, and Sergeant Brien moved to the Community Resource Unit.

The fifth team consist of Officer Brandon Tinker and K-9 Odin. Tinker and Odin are a single purpose explosive detection team currently assigned to the Community Resource Unit. They also assist with school security and the city's numerous special events.

#### **SWAT**



Sevierville Police Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) is a 14-man unit that is attached to the Operations Bureau. The team consists of Commander Lt. Jamie Roberts, Assistant Commander Lt. Matt Nicol, Team Leader Lt. Robby Nelms, Officers Shain Burgess, Sgt. Thomas Thompson, Sgt. Morgan Watts, Jacob Mattern, Sgt. Jordan Chambers, Sgt. Tom Hart, Chase Singleton, Karl Hilliard, Julio Cruz, Alan Williams, and Medic Britton Turner. SWAT is a part time team that can be fully operational in less than thirty minutes. SWAT's primary function is serving high risk search and arrest warrants, active shooter situations, high priority security details, counter surveillance, barricaded subjects, and any other high-risk situations that need a tactical element. SWAT conducts training once a month with high standards set in discipline, firearms, and physical training. SWAT works closely and trains with other Special Operations teams including, EOD, Negotiations, and the K9 Unit.

During the year SWAT conducted multi-agency training. This training incorporated SWAT teams from neighboring agencies and added medical support in reference to active shooter situations. SWAT was activated for two call outs, conducted five search warrants, four assistance of other agencies, and provided security details for various events. SWAT also upgraded equipment with the use of drone, Pepper Ball gun, and a new breaching system. The use of technology from the throw phone to the use of drones

has proven to be beneficial during operations.



#### Honor Guard

The primary role of the unit is to provide funeral honors for fallen officers and other requests. The honor guard also serves as the "guardians of the colors" by displaying and escorting the national flag on ceremonial occasions at official city functions. The honor guard is comprised of a commander, assistant commander, and six other members. The honor guard continues to present a positive image of the department, while assisting with the department's recruiting efforts by maintaining dedication to duty.

Honor Guard members participated in thirteen events in 2022, from presenting colors to ceremonial events throughout the city.







#### Crisis Intervention Team

CIT officers are dispatched to subjects that are having a mental health crisis and calls of suspicious people who may also need mental health treatment. In 2022, Sevierville Police Department and the other agencies Sevier County Crisis Intervention Team were awarded the Rising Star Award for our training.


### Training

Due to Covid restrictions lifting, the department was back to training, with logging 2700 hours of departmental and specialized training in 2022. Four officers became certified in bike patrol, and six new field training officers were added.

We also changed body cameras in April and went to a new and improved HD body camera, which has proven to be an improvement to our previous body cameras. This change has allowed us to be able to streamline case files for the court.

Ten Ford Explorers and one Ford F-150 have been purchased for FY23 to improve our fleet and updated older vehicles. We are still awaiting delivery of these vehicles.





### Community Resource Unit



The Community Resource Unit is comprised of one Lieutenant, one Sergeant, one bomb detection K9 team, two officers, and six reserve officers. There was a vacant officer position which was filled in December. This unit is responsible for special events, problem areas, senior housing complexes, government housing complex, public education, as well as all safety and prevention programs.

CRU was able to have our first Citizen's Police Academy since 2020.

We started with 15 students and 12 graduated after the 9 classes.

There were only three car seat events in 2022. The rest of the year citizens were assisted on a one-one-one basis at the department.

We also had technicians to respond to accident scenes and traffic stops to provide car seats to citizens in need.



We have four officers that are certified to teach the Rape Aggression Defense.

CRU was only able to have one class in 2022, which hosted eight students.



### Community Resource Unit

#### Community Outreach:

Another focus of the Community Resource Unit is community outreach. Adult Protection Services, officers and other community agencies notify us if they have someone in need. It is sometimes a senior who has had their money stolen by a family member, a woman trying to leave an unsafe situation or a senior who needs resources. We meet with the citizens and see what resources they qualify for. We take applications with us so that we can fill them out quickly and start getting some help. Below are a few examples of how we have helped citizen to increase their quality of life. Our unit does community outreach every day. On Christmas we teamed up with patrol and Golden Corral to deliver 23 meals and visited seniors that were going to be alone for Christmas. Each senior also got a gift that was donated by The My People Senior Center and the Evergreen Elves.
